Population Growth 1911 - 2036

Nyora's population remained stable between 1911 and 1961, then doubled in the years 1960 to 2006 and increased further to 2011.



Employment

There are 720 people in the workforce with 428 people employed full time. The proportion of people in full time employment is higher than other towns in South Gippsland.



Diversity

144 of Nyora's residents were born overseas. Most overseas born residents come from the United Kingdom and Ireland.

Most people moving to Nyora in the past five years came from other parts of Victoria. The most common Victorian places include the Shires of Casey, Frankston, Mornington Peninsula and Yarra Ranges.



Education

A larger proportion of children attend Government Primary Schools than Victoria.

468 people in Nyora attended an educational insitution.

Income



The individual weekly income is higher than in South Gippsland.

Mortgage repayments and weekly rents are higher in Nyora than South Gippsland.

A higher proportion of high income households in Nyora than South Gippsland.

Housing



There are 575 dwellings in Nyora with 92 per cent occupied.

91.5 percent of houses are occupied compared with South Gippsland's 74 percent.

There is a greater proportion of couples with children and one parent families in Nyora than South Gippsland



Car Ownership

1 percent of households in Nyora do not own motor vehicle.

21.2 percent of households have one motor vehicle.

36 percent of households have two motor vehicles.

20 percent of households have three or more motor vehicles.

Care

A larger proportion of people in Nyora provided unpaid care for children other than in South Gippsland.

A larger proportion of people provided unpaid assistance to people with a disability, reflecting the larger proportion of people in the Nyora population needing assistance due to disability.



Key Points in History

The township of Nyora was procalmed in 1886.

Nyora station became a junction stop to change trains to the Bass Valley dairy towns in 1910.
