The population for the South East Coastal District, which includes Waratah Bay, is forecast to grow from 5,397 in 2016 to 5,838 by 2036.



Employment

There are 21 people in the workforce with 9 people employed full time.

Only 3 Waratah Bay residents were born overseas.

There is no recorded data for any languages spoken at home other than English.

People moving to South Gippsland came from other Parts of Victoria including; Casey, Frankston, Mornington Peninsula and Yarra Ranges.

All residents attending an educational institution were children attending primary schools and seconday schools.

The individual weekly median income in Waratah Bay is lower than South Gippsland.

28.6 percent of the population provided unpaid assistance to a person with a disability.

Housing



There are 111 dwellings in Waratah Bay with 20 permanently occupied.

There is a smaller proportion couples with children and a greater proportion of one parent families in Waratah Bay than South Gippsland.



Key Points in History

1803 Originally named Paterson Bay by the French navigator Baudin during an expedition to map the coast of Australia.

1885 Post office was opened and called Waratah Bay, later renamed Walkerville due to its location.
