Coal Creek Community Park and Museum hosted Museums Australia (Victoria) for their Hands-on Disaster Response Training last week.

Paper and Photographs Conservator Nurul (Noni) Zachri from the University of Melbourne Grimwade Centre took participants through salvage and disaster recovery scenarios in case of emergency events.

The workshop prepared participants for retrieving items from a disaster site, assessing treatment required, drying water damaged material and cleaning soot damaged material along with other restoration techniques.

Local museum candidates were joined by participants from the Vietnam Veterans Museum, Churchill Island Museum, Port Welshpool Museum and two museum students from Melbourne University to take part in the day's activities.
