### FACT SHEET #3: Purchasing Property with a Septic System



A commonly overlooked aspect of purchasing a property is the potential presence of a septic system. Being well informed, asking the right questions and having effective conditions put into contracts of sale can save significant future costs.

# Why should you care?

The current owner of a property is responsible for the effective operation of the septic system, regardless of any action or inaction of previous owners.

This means you could unsuspectingly take on the following obligations:

- Servicing and pump out overdue: estimated cost \$300
- Unapproved modification of system or system not in compliance with permit: remediation costs can reach into the \$1,000s
- System irreparably damaged or failing due to poor maintenance: full replacement of system, estimated cost \$10,000+

Septic type, size and location can also limit potential extensions or uses of buildings, preventing you from using the property as you intended.

#### How Do I Know if a Property has a Septic System?

Most properties will show no sign of having a system as they are often fully contained underground.

The two ways to conclusively identify if a property has a system are:

- Lack of sewer or wastewater charges on the Section 32
- Contact Council's Environmental Health department

The map on the reverse side of this page shows the general areas which are sewered and therefore <u>not</u> likely to have septic systems.

## What should you do before purchasing a property?

A few easy steps can help to ensure there are no nasty surprises after settlement:

- Ask the vendor to provide records of inspections and servicing by a licensed plumber
- Ask for inspection, servicing and, if applicable, necessary maintenance of the system be included as part of the contract for purchase
- Have a licensed plumber inspect the system to give advice on possible future issues
- Ask for the vendor to provide a copy of the Permit to Install for the system (if they do not have a copy they can apply to Council for the permit conditions and system site plans).
