For anyone who missed the meeting a couple of key decisions were made surrounding the planning permit for the Korumburra Community Hub and Phase Two of the COVID-19 Community Support Package.

Phase Two of the COVID-19 Community Support Package allocates a further \$393,110 to assist with mental health training, a creative and cultural arts program, regional promotion and a tourism grants program.
