Advocacy Goes to Canberra

Productive and positive engagement with State and Federal governments can often assist in seeing successful outcomes at a Council level. Due to the very nature of our government system that we must work within, Councils across Australia rely on both the State and Federal governments for funding and assistance.

Last week along with Deputy Mayor Williams and Chief Executive Officer Kerryn Ellis, I travelled to Canberra to advocate for South Gippsland and to share our key priorities.

We wasted no time, meeting with the offices of 11 key Ministers, Members and heads of departments, as well as attending Question Time. Key advocacy points were around infrastructure, roads and transport, agriculture, renewable energy, our local environment, mental health and education.

This visit is just the beginning of taking South Gippsland's advocacy priorities, more generally, to both State and Federal governments. I will continue to demonstrate our local need and opportunities at future meetings and events, aimed at getting the attention of decision makers at both levels of government. South Gippsland also has a strong voice that can be used through my recent appointments to the Municipal Association of Victoria (MAV) board and as Deputy Chair of One Gippsland.

I truly believe that South Gippsland has a bright future and I'm confident that our clear and coordinated advocacy plan, together with proactive engagement, will assist in ensuring our continued future success.
