**Ongoing lease for the Old Kindergarten Building at Dumbalk**

Dear Helen,

I am writing to you on behalf of the Dumbalk & District Progress Association (DDPA) to request an ongoing lease of the Old Kindergarten Building at Tarwin Street Dumbalk from the South Gippsland Shire Council.

After the closure of the Dumbalk Kindergarten the DDPA leased the Building at Tarwin Street Dumbalk from the Shire for the preparations of the “Dumbalk & Districts Back to Celebrations” in 2008. Incidentally, the DDPA won the “Best Community Event of the Year” for this event.

In 2009 the DDPA requested an ongoing lease from the Shire Council of the old Kinder Building at Dumbalk. At that stage the DDPA was given a short term lease.

Since then the DDPA have been negotiating with the Shire to obtain an ongoing lease of the building for Community Use and a Heritage and Historical Centre. After several meetings with Shire Staff we have a Business Plan which we will submit to the Shire Council for an ongoing lease of the Building.

During the last 3 years the DDPA have not been able to proceed with all our plans because of the uncertainty of our future at the building.

On 13<sup>th</sup> December 2012 the Gardiner Foundation offered the DDPA \$5,700.00 for the Community and Heritage Hub. The Foundation is holding the money, for a short period, subject to the necessary documentation of securing the site for the Hub.

The Foundation only offered funding for IT equipment and not the security windows and doors, furnishings or connections as the lease is not confirmed.

The DDPA would be grateful if the ongoing lease could be finalized as soon as possible and I look forward to discussing the requirements with you at your earliest convenience.

## Business Plan

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## **1. Business Overview**

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### **Dumbalk & District Progress Association**

The Dumbalk & District Progress Association (DDPA) was formed in 1980 out of a need to have a voice for the community in the Dumbalk Township. Since that time it has grown to become the leading association in the district; raising funds for community groups, holding a number of annual and one off events, beautifying the township and becoming the keeper of the area's history.

After the closure of the Dumbalk Kindergarten, the DDPA leased it from the Shire on an annual basis. It has now become a community and historical hub where town meetings, seminars, social gatherings and classes are held.

Unlike other community groups in the area, whose interests are centred on their own particular area, e.g. Dumbalk Hall Committee, Dumbalk CFA, the DDPA has a much broader scope of action, to respond to community needs. As an example, when the Dumbalk General Store faced closure in 2008 it was the DDPA that alerted the community to the situation and the consequences of losing the store. The DDPA then held meetings that led to the successful sale of the business and its ongoing success as the community realised its importance and supports it.

In the immediate future the DDPA will continue its work as in the past and will seek to extend its scope of action. With a secure lease on the "Kinda" premises the DDPA will grow that centre as a community and historical hub and education

facility. The DDPA has been preparing for ongoing use of the Kinda by adding to the facilities assets, e.g. we recently purchased a computer, projector, screen and whiteboard; supporting the intention of setting the building up as a hub for community education, with much needed internet access and computer classes.

The building is already used by the community for a number of educational and leisure activities ([see appendix 1a](#)) that we intend to grow as the community identifies its interests and needs.

We will continue to build on the wealth of historical material that we have, as a result of the very successful Centenary that we instigated and co-ordinated in 2008 and work towards having the history of the Tarwin Valley on display and available for all to see.

## **Achievements of the DDPA**

- Organised working bees for tree clearing and tree plantation at the Recreation Reserve and entrances to town, after residents input. Many Waratahs were planted in the township and tree ferns in Heritage Park.
- Members constructed and planted trees at the Reg. Moore Entrance.
- Development of “Park at Cross Roads” at the crossroads.
- Co-ordinated with the Shire to purchase two allotments.
- DDPA members constructed a new boundary fence at the Park
- Redeveloped the newly named Heritage Park.
- Organised the installation of the display cabinets in the gazebo, the photograph display in the gazebo, road directory board, drink fountain and the night light for the Gum Tree; all funded with grants and donations. The Shire has since taken over the maintenance of the park.
- Members constructed the Bus Shelter for Senior Citizens and School Students in the Memorial Park.
- Co-ordinated with the Shire for Senior’s transport to and from Leongatha in the 1980’s and again in 2011 set up a bus service in conjunction with The Mirboo North RSL and Leongatha RSL and DDPA.

- Lobbied the Shire and State Government (with Nerrena Progress Association) for the reconstruction of Nerrena Road at Nerrena. This was the last major road works carried out by the Shire.
- Co-ordinated with the South Gippsland Water Board for the installation of the Water Treatment Plant.
- Reconstruction of Nerrena Road from Tarwin River to the township and reconstruction of McKitterick's Road, in co-operation with the Shire.
- In partnership with the Shire and Murray Goulburn, commissioned the artist Dennis Leversha to paint the Heritage Mural on Murray Goulburn's north wall. DDPA members constructed the Mural Plaque in the Mural's garden. The Shire constructed a garden in front of the mural. DDPA installed a moon on the mural.
- In 2005 members constructed the walking Track from the town to the Recreation Reserve (another excellent outcome), well within the grant budget of \$10,000; an excellent outcome (The shire's estimate for the project was \$25,000).
- Successfully lobbied Vic Roads to resurface the "Loves Lane" bends, develop a safe road junction at the corner of Loves Lane and Farmer's Road, erect animal warning signs at Nerrena, install roadside barriers rails on the "Nerrena Road" bends and repair a 'dip in the road' near Campisi's property.
- New lines installed on Nerrena Road after the DDPA met with Vic Roads and Shire staff on a number of occasions about the cross Roads.
- DDPA organised the Community New Millennium Celebrations in the Local Hall.
- DDPA organised (by Public request) public meetings in the Dumbalk Hall regarding the possibility of Wind Farms in our area. 1<sup>st</sup> Meeting: 80 people. 2<sup>nd</sup> Meeting: 360 people.
- Organise annual Christmas celebrations and decorate the Memorial Park, the Annual Car Boot and Craft Sale during autumn and annual "thank you BBQ" for our CFA Members.

- The DDPA has worked with the Shire and obtained a number of grants to instigate a range of improvements in Memorial Park
  - constructed of a path through the Park and installing a seat
  - construction of a Shelter and twin BBQ's
  - Constructing and planting a garden at both ends of the shelter and at the north side of the park and maintain the area.
- Supported and encouraged the establishment of Tarwin Valley Camp Draft Club at Dumbalk Recreation Reserve.
- 'Back to Dumbalk' Celebrations in 2008; which won the Shire best Community Event in 2009.
- Construction of a public notice board at Telstra exchange, fund by a successful application to the Mirboo North Community Foundation.
- Acquisition of a filing cabinet to store historical photos, also funded by a grant application.

## **2. Products/Services**

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The Dumbalk Community Hub ( Kinda) provides a base for:

- Community events, that brings the people of the Lower Tarwin Valley together to connect and socialise.
- The initiation of special projects, including organising, funding and facilitating projects through out the community that beautify, update or add to the quality of life in the Dumbalk District with new and or improved services and structures, e.g. a community bus service, Community notice boards, Signage.
- Community groups to meet and socialise.
- Community groups and other organisations to hold information sessions, seminars and leisure classes.

- Community groups to hold classes to improve or gain skills necessary in a changing world.
- Collecting, storing and displaying the history of the Lower Tarwin Valley.
- Publishing and distributing a quarterly newsletter informing the community of news and events specific to their lives whilst providing an avenue for the community to advertise, communicate and read about people and events of the Dumbalk District.
- Engaging the youth of the Dumbalk District allowing them to socialise with each other and to give them a sense of community.
- A central point for newcomers to the Dumbalk District to be informed about the area they have chosen to live.
- The development and maintenance of a website specific to the Dumbalk District to promote the area and inform the community.
- The development and maintenance of a data base of email addresses to facilitate good communications across the Dumbalk District.

### **3. Market Analysis**

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In a broader sense the community of the Lower Tarwin Valley is the market for the services DDPA provides.

- We target the whole community in the distribution of the newsletter, the community events we hold and the availability of the Community Hub and its assets.

- For educational courses we are more specific by targeting members of the community who have special needs. e.g. community members who have limited computer skills are targeted for our planned 'Introduction to Computer' course.(appendix 1b)
- The market for our services and assets is growing as more people move into the area and as modern day skills become essential in a changing world.
- There is an increasing need to preserve the history of the area and there is no other community group available to expand it and undertake its preservation.
- In the information age the DDPA is the group the community look to for education and information.

## 4. Competition

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### **Newsletter**

Whilst there are other providers of news within South Gippsland much of it is not relevant to the Dumbalk District.

### **Community Hub**

There is no other facility within the Dumbalk District that has the facilities and is available for such a wide variety of uses.

### **Educational, Skills and Leisure courses**

Whilst there are courses held for those that wish to travel further afield the DDPA, through community consultation, is holding courses that there is already a demand for in the area. We are

also conducting them at times that are suitable for those interested. As a volunteer organisation we are able to minimise costs for these services.

### **Historical Preservation**

There is no other community group interested in preserving the areas history. Since the centenary celebration held in 2008 the DDPA has built on its extensive records of the last 100 years that it began collating for that event.

### **Competition for Committee Members**

- With limited number of people within the community willing to commit to being a part of any community group there is competition between community groups for members. The DDPA has a broader scope of interests in the Lower Tarwin Valley as a whole rather than being defined by more specific interests. There are always members of the community willing to participate with a group that has the betterment of the whole district as its main focus.

## **5. Marketing Strategy**

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○ The DDPA aims to be able to communicate with the people of the Dumbalk District and promote its services and assets at minimum costs.

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



PROJECT PLAN for DDPA November 2010

COMMUNITY & HERITAGE HUB OF LOWER TARWIN VALLEY PROJECT  
FORMER KINDERGARTEN BUILDING

PHASE 1

- Set up an email account for Dumbalk DPA
- Install security screens to office windows and security door to external door
- Connect Phone to site
- Install internet facilities-(either ADSL.-Satellite or antennae)
- Purchase equipment- office computer, 6 lap tops and covers, laser scanner and printer, shredder. Office desk & chair, digital Dictaphone, laminator. Paper trimmer, sundry office accessories, office sundries
- Plan future education and information workshops and seek trainers for this
- Run computer classes
- Interview retired dairy farmers to obtain the history of the area
- Obtain a medium sized fireproof safe
- Provide assistance to the elderly to access internet resources and electronically storing their history.

❖ Time Line One year

PHASE 2

- Purchase storage cabinets, glass display cabinets and a free-standing poster size plastic protected flip file
- Design a website for Dumbalk
- Provide computer lessons for elderly residents, retired and current dairy farmers
- Investigate establishing a visiting Medical Centre in existing Infant Welfare consulting rooms
- Include primary aged students in gathering information from grandparents or other elderly residents. This could be taped oral histories or in computer or book form.
- Devise and print questionnaire style booklets to be completed by residents with: Where were you born? What was your favourite childhood pastime? Etc.
- Subscribe to the Genealogy Society of Victoria or websites like Ancestry .com
- Advertising to market our facility in tourism brochures and websites
- Continue collecting, scanning and safely storing historical local artefacts both indigenous and European
- Seek donations of identically frames historical family photos for permanent display
- Provide speakers/workshops on tracing family trees
- Devise a local "heritage trail" of European historical and dairying sites to create tourism interest

❖ Time Line – To set up and implement by end of 2014

PHASE 3

- Continue gathering historical information from clubs. Businesses and families
- Provide workshops to strengthen our community by looking at diversity in agriculture like niche markets, tourism and B & B's
- Employ a curator/caretaker/cleaner
- Erect solar panels on north-facing roof to upgrade to more sustainable heating and cooling of building
- Continue to be a sustainable and ongoing enterprise
- Commission an author to write about "Herd Testing" which originated in this area
- Commission author to write "History of Young Farmers" which originated in this area.
- Update present storage area to locate a Historical model of Dumbalk
- To obtain funding for a "Men's Shed" to be erected in the Community Centre site.

## Dumbalk & District

Dumbalk is a town in the South Gippsland region of Victoria, Australia. It is in the heart of South Gippsland dairy industry and features lush green pastures most of the year around. It is centred in the Tarwin Valley and it exudes beautiful surrounding views. The word Dumbalk is an Aboriginal word that means winter, frost and rain- hence the excellent production qualities. The township features a local store and cafe, a farming hardware store, commercial nursery, sign writer, sheet metal business, MDU Football/Netball Club, MDU Cricket Club and school bus transport to a variety of nearby schools. Recreational activities include; local camp drafts, football, netball, cricket, card playing, indoor recreational games, craft and regular dances in the town hall. Dumbalk is renowned for one of the best local halls in the South Gippsland area. A trip to the Dumbalk must include one of the many scenic drives in the surrounding area. (Wikipedia)

Dumbalk and District is part of the area described as Rural North East of South Gippsland, it is a predominantly rural area. Rural North East includes the small townships and localities of Allambie Reserve (part), Allambie South (part), Arawata, Berrys Creek, Boolarong, Boolarra (part), Boolarra South (part), Boorool, Darlimurla (part), Delburn (part), Dollar, **Dumbalk North**, Fairbank, Gunyah, Hallston, Kardella, Koorooman, Leongatha North, Mardan, Mirboo (part), Mount Eccles, Mount Eccles South, Poowong East (part), Ranceby, Ruby, Strzelecki (part), Thorpdale South (part), Trida (part), Turtons Creek, Wild Dog Valley and Woorarra West. Rural North East is bounded by Baw Baw Shire and the locality of Mirboo North in the north, Latrobe City and Wellington Shire in the east, the localities of Toora North and Mount Best, the Franklin River, the locality of Wonga, Boolarra-Foster Road, the localities of Foster, Foster North, Stony Creek and Meeniyau in the south, and the localities of Nerrena, Leongatha, Kardella South, Korumburra, Poowong and Poowong North in the west.

Settlement of the area dates from the mid 1800s, with gradual growth from the late 1800s into the early 1900s. The most significant development occurred during the interwar and post-war periods. The population has declined slightly since the early 1990s, a result of few dwellings being added to the area and a decline in the average number of persons living in each dwelling. Land is used mainly for dairy and beef farming as well as cropping for potatoes, peas and vineyards. Dumbalk and District also hosts an annual Garden Day and annual Christmas Party in the memorial park.



# Who are we?

## Population Profile

### Dumbalk (Suburb)

In the 2011 Census, there were 113 **families** in Dumbalk (Suburb), 47 couples with children, 59 Couple families without children and 7 One Parent families with an overall district population of 412.

The median weekly individual **income** for persons aged 15 years and over who were usual residents was \$396, compared with \$577 in Australia. The median weekly household income was \$840, compared with \$1,234 in Australia. The median weekly family income was \$900 compared with \$1,481 in Australia.

There were a total of 157 private **dwellings** counted in Dumbalk (Suburb) 75 were fully owned, 60 being purchased and 16 rented with 5 being not stated. 113 were family households, 37 lone person household and 6 group households.


# South Gippsland Profile

## South Gippsland - Shire wide statistics



# Introduction & purpose

## Introduction

Contained in the plan is also a list of priority areas, which the community believes should be focused on to fulfil the vision. In addition, suggested action plans, which may be undertaken to fulfil the vision, are included.

Essentially, the Dumbalk & District Community Plan looks at what we value in the Dumbalk district and what we want it to become.

## The Purpose of the Community Plan

The purpose of the Dumbalk & District Community Plan is to provide the opportunity for the community to discuss and decide the future it sees for itself.

The plan will provide residents with certainty in regards to growth and development in the town, the types of services that can realistically be provided, the opportunities that are available now and in the future. It will set priorities in areas such as infrastructure, health, roads and the development of land.

This plan is owned by the community and will form the basis of discussion with other interested groups such as government and business in the future. It is not a static plan but an evolving one which will provide us with much needed direction into what is otherwise an uncertain future. It will be a way of mapping the future for ourselves and our children and hopefully set a good foundation for our grandchildren.

# Planning process

## Community Plan Development and Distribution - process, promotion and communication

### 1. Pre Community Promotion and Communication

The major objective of the Community Plan development process has been to ensure that all members of the community had the opportunity to contribute to the creation of the community plan for Dumbalk & District.

As part of the Lower Tarwin Valley Districts Project, the Dumbalk & District Community Plan development process commenced with the South Gippsland Shire Council's Lower Tarwin Valley Community Facilitator gathering all existing information, reports and previous community consultations that had occurred over the past 5 years. This information was then formed into a Community Plan Working Document and introduced at the Dumbalk & District Progress Association meeting to invite the community to participate in the Community Planning process.

The Dumbalk & District Progress Association partnered with the Lower Tarwin Valley Project to become the lead community organisation to help drive the Community Planning process. Several meetings took place with the Dumbalk & District Progress Association to help facilitate community consultation, engagement and ensure the Community Planning process met the individual needs of the community prior to the Dumbalk & District Community Planning Workshop.

The community consultation and engagement process included:

- Individual presentation by the Lower Tarwin Valley Project to the Dumbalk & District Progress Association
- Establishment of a Community Planning Working Group through the Dumbalk & District Progress Association
- Advertising and promotion to the community for the Community Workshops through the delivery of notices to householders, community notices, newspaper articles and newspaper advertisements
- Community workshop held and facilitated by the South Gippsland Shire Council's Lower Tarwin Valley Project to identify Priority Projects and Community Project Teams
- Youth specific engagement sessions and meetings
- Development of the Vision for Dumbalk & District and the Draft Dumbalk & District Community Plan
- Presentation of the Draft Dumbalk & District Community Plan to community members and other key stakeholders for comment
- Distribution of the finalised Dumbalk & District Community Plan

## 2. Post Community Plan Promotion and Communication

Once the Draft Dumbalk & District Community Plan was developed, the plan was distributed to members of the community to allow for review and feedback. After an agreed review period any changes were incorporated and the finalised version of the Community Plan available to the broad community of Dumbalk & District.

## 3. Community Plan Distribution and Action

The completed Dumbalk & District Community Plan will be available to all members of the Dumbalk & District communities. South Gippsland Shire Council is committed to support the community of Dumbalk & Districts and the Project Teams to help develop actions for Priority Projects outlined in the Dumbalk & District Community Plan when appropriate. The community will be regularly informed of progress in relation to the community plan through the Dumbalk & District Progress Association.




